PROGRAM OBJECTIVE

POSSIBLE PROJECTS

L.E.D.R. requires its participants to take part in a project the year following the summer camp outing. The project can be anything the participant wants, as long as it benefits the community. Example projects could include:

- Creating and running a Special Olympics event.
- Running donation drives for medical supplies.
- Creating a database to help police in their ability to contact business owners in town.
- Cleaning up local parks by creating new trails or replanting the trees and bushes.
- Promote bike use by gaining town support and teaching bike safety.
- Help teach children how to read by creating an educational reading program with the local elementary school.

COURSE OVERVIEW

- *L.E.D.R.* is a co-educational program open to all 15-20 year old boys and girls—Scouts and non-Scouts.

- Cost is \$500 per person per week—our goal is to offset this cost with corporate donations and institutional support. This includes housing & meals, staff support, busing and additional transportation.
- *L.E.D.R.* is an exciting and educational one week program located at beautiful Winnebago Scout Reservation in Rockaway, New Jersey.



The components of the *L.E.D.R.* program have been selected to match up with several significant areas of life and job skills that are not easily obtained through general educational means.

This program has been developed and implemented to provide educational and vocational exposure to young adults within New Jersey. This effort will provide a connection between the participants, and government leaders, corporations, and educational facilities by providing a broad view of activities that supports the current needs of our communities.

One of the major aspects of this effort will be the commitment required by both the participants, and the mentors. A personally meaningful project will be developed by each *L.E.D.R.* participant, and he/she will be supported by one or more mentors. This will provide the participants with connections (via Ment-Working*) and exposure to issues that we all deal with during our lives. These opportunities can assist in various ways from selecting a career path, to choosing a political party to support, to handling the prolonged illness of a loved one, etc.

**Note: "ment-working" is a hybrid term developed by L.E.D.R. to couple Mentoring Support with Networking Skills to advance participants capabilities in all aspects of personal and career growth.*
